

## ***APOSTLE JUDE THE BROTHER OF THE LORD***

The Holy Apostle Jude, one of the 12 Apostles of Christ, is descended from King David and Solomon, and was the son of Righteous Joseph the Betrothed, by his first wife.

The Holy Apostle John the Theologian writes in his Gospel, "...neither did his brethren believe in Him" (John 7:5). St. Theophylact explains this passage. He says that at the beginning of Jesus' earthly ministry, Joseph's sons, Jude among them, did not believe in His divine nature. Tradition says that when St. Joseph returned from Egypt, he began to divide his possessions among his sons. He wanted to allot a share to Jesus, but the brothers were opposed to this because Jesus was born of another mother. Only James, later called "The Brother of God," offered to share his portion with Him.

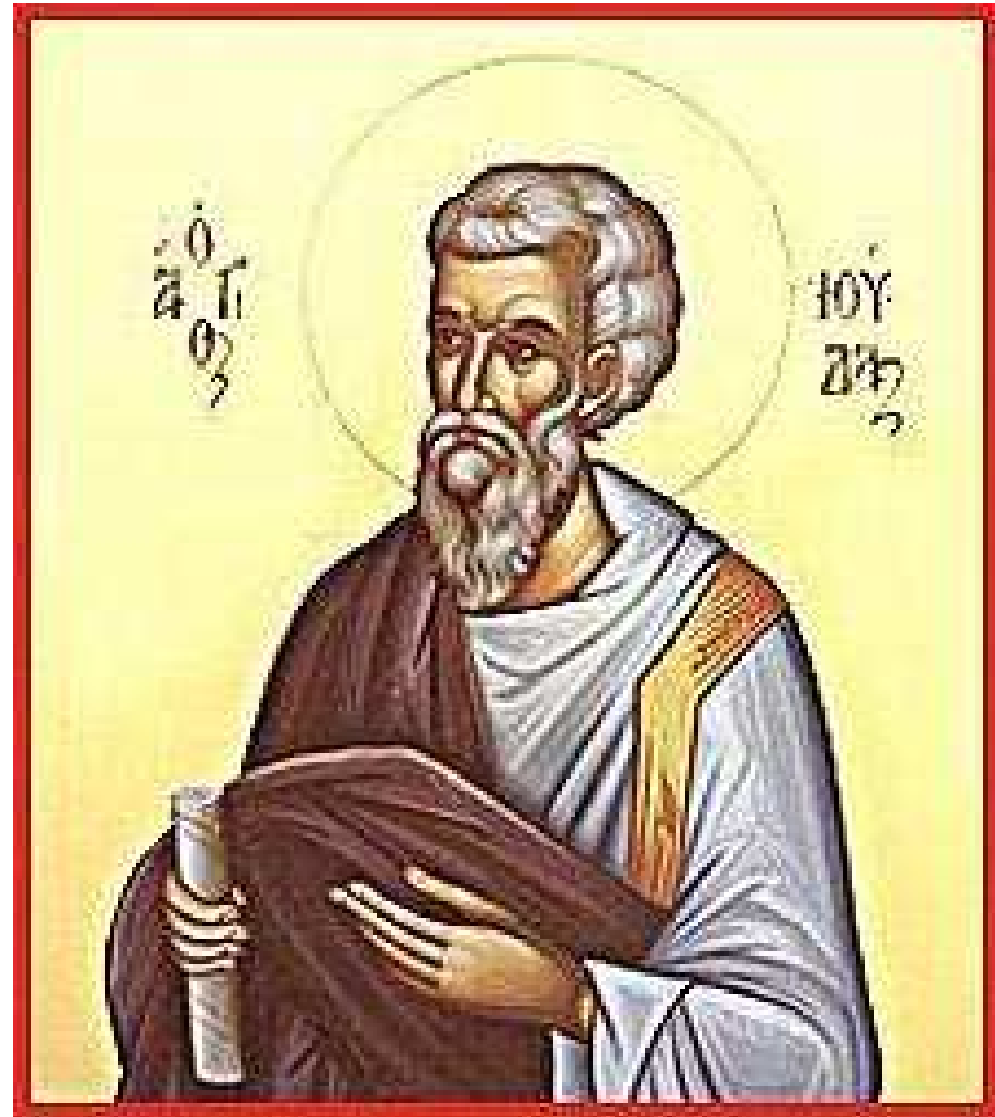
St. Jude came to believe in Christ the Savior as the awaited Messiah, and he followed Him and was chosen as one of the twelve Apostles. Mindful of his sin, Jude considered himself unworthy to be called the Lord's brother, and in his Epistle, he calls himself merely the brother of James.

After the Ascension of the Lord, St. Jude traveled about, preaching the Gospel. He propagated the faith in Christ at first in Judea, Galilee, Samaria and Idumaia, and later in the lands of Arabia, Syria and Mesopotamia. Finally, he went to the city of Edessa. Here he finished the work that was not completed by his predecessor, St. Thaddeus, Apostle of the Seventy. There is a tradition that St. Jude went to Persia, where he wrote his catholic Epistle in Greek.

St. Jude's Epistle speaks about the Holy Trinity, about the Incarnation of the Lord, about the good and bad angels, and about the dread Last Judgment. The Apostle urges believers to guard themselves against fleshly impurity, to be diligent in prayer, faith and love, to convert the lost to the path of salvation, and to guard themselves from the teachings of heretics. He also says that it is not enough just to be converted to Christianity, but faith must be demonstrated by good works. He cites the rebellious angels and men punished by God to support this.

The Holy Apostle Jude died as a martyr around the year 80 near Mt. Ararat in Armenia, where he was crucified and pierced with arrows.

LETTERS TO ST. PAUL FROM ROME - I

*(For Christians, St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans is one of the most important and influential books in the Bible. Majestic in style and in content, it is exhilarating, provocative and challenging. It is also quite dense, requiring prayerful study and much attention. St. Paul wrote it just prior to his journey to Rome, evidently after he either heard about or received some information from the capital. Some of the selections of this Epistle become more meaningful when we consider them as the Apostle's answers to specific comments. As we are now in the liturgical season when we read this Epistle, we offer selections from Romans as if they were St. Paul's replies to letters.)*

Dear Apostle,

We are eagerly anticipating your coming to Rome and look forward to meeting you and learning from you about this new faith, Christianity. I am one of the members of the Jewish congregation here in Rome. There is considerable Jewish presence in the capital city; we have been here for some time and we are proud of being righteous Jews, members of a venerable religious tradition, as well as active citizens of the Roman empire. Word has come to us that Christianity is a new religion that is based on Jewish tradition but also has some very different and provocative things based on the teachings and life of someone named Jesus Christ. We Jews possess the law, the teachings of God, and we believe that it is only through the law that one achieves God's mercy. Are you saying that, from God's point of view, there is no difference between a Jew and a Gentile? Isn't that completely against our accepted religious tradition?

Dear N,

*God will render to every man according to his works; to those who by patience in well-doing seek for glory and honor and immortality, he will give eternal life; but for those who are factious and do not obey the truth, but obey wickedness, there will be wrath and fury. There will be tribulation and distress for every human being who does evil, the Jew first and also the Gentile, but glory and honor and peace for every one who does good, the Jew first and also the Gentile. For God shows no partiality.*

*All who have sinned without the law will also perish without the law, and all who have sinned under the law will be judged by the law. For it is not the hearers of the law who are righteous before God, but the doers of the law who will be justified. When Gentiles, who have not the law do by nature what the law requires, they are a law unto themselves, even though they do not have the law. They show that what the law requires is written in their hearts, while their conscience also bears witness and their conflicting thoughts accuse or perhaps excuse them on that day when, according to my gospel, God judges the secrets of men by Christ Jesus. [Romans 2:6-16]*
