

***HOLY WONDERWORKERS AND UNMERCENARY
PHYSICIANS COSMAS AND DAMIAN
OF MESOPOTAMIA***

Holy Wonderworkers Cosmas and Damian and their mother St. Theodota were natives of Asia Minor. Their pagan father died while they were small children, and their mother raised them in Christian piety. Through her example and by reading holy books to them, St. Theodota preserved her children in purity of life according to the command of the Lord.

Trained and skilled as physicians, they received from the Holy Spirit the gift of healing people's illnesses by the power of prayer. They even treated animals. With fervent love for both God and neighbor, they never took payment for their services, observing the Lord's command, "Freely have you received, freely give." (Matthew 10:8) Their fame spread throughout the region, and people called them unmercenary physicians.

They were summoned to a grievously ill woman named Palladia, whom others deemed hopeless. Through faith and fervent prayer of the brothers, the Lord healed her of a deadly disease, and Palladia arose from her bed perfectly healthy, praising God. In gratitude, Palladia went quietly to Damian, presented him with 3 eggs and said, "Take this small gift in the Name of the Holy Life-Creating Trinity, the Father Son, and Holy Spirit." Hearing the Name of the Holy Trinity, Damian did not dare refuse.

When St. Cosmas learned of this, he became very sad, believing his brother had broken their strict vow. On his deathbed, he instructed that his brother should not be buried beside him. St. Damian died shortly afterward, and the people did not know where to bury him. But through the will of God, a miracle occurred. A camel, which the saints had treated, spoke with a human voice saying that there should be no doubts placing the brothers together because Damian did not accept the eggs as payment but out of respect for the Name of God. The venerable brothers were buried together at Mesopotamia, and many miracles were worked after their death as well.

THE PANDEMIC AMONG US!

Last Sunday our Parish Council met after the Divine Liturgy, at which a significant part of the discussion was about the Covid-related problems that affect us. For the past couple of weeks we have been following a reasonable course of practice, following the precautions that have become routine. But with the possibility of increased numbers of sickness due to the virus, we decided that it was a good time to reassess our participation in parish life.

Like parishes throughout our entire Church, we are dealing with a situation that none of us have ever dealt with. Many people have gone through hard and difficult times, but living through a pandemic on such a world-wide scale that affects every human being everywhere is a heretofore unknown condition. There are scientists and scholars who, thank God, are working rapidly and diligently on finding out just how the virus affects us, how it is spread, its lasting consequences, what medicines can mitigate or cure it, and what vaccines will enable us to live a “normal” life without fear. However, everything is in the realm of the unknown! Like all of us, scientists are dealing with something that is frustratingly bewildering.

It should not surprise us that what we must do in our daily lives, as well as in our participation in church life, is to be resolute in being as sensible and cautious as possible. It is clear from the overwhelming consensus of doctors and scientists that there are two basic and very easy to be followed measures which all of us need to do as often as is necessary: wear masks and observe social distance. There are good reasons to believe that if everyone were to follow those practices, the numbers of sick people would decrease. But alas, the numbers of infected sick people are going up everywhere, and Ohio seems to be one of the more critical states. For now, neither Archbishop Paul nor official State directives indicate a change in the guidelines. Nevertheless, we are entering what may be a more precarious season; and with that in mind, this is a good time to re-affirm the conditions for worship and social events at church.

- Masks should be worn at all times, in the church and hall, except when eating or drinking in the hall. Masks should cover both nose and mouth. For those receiving Communion, masks should be removed at reception of the Holy Gifts and bread, then replaced. Extra masks are available in the vestibule together with hand sanitizer.
- Keep a distance of at least 6’ between people (couples or small families count as one). This is to be observed throughout the church proper and in the Communion line. Please be aware that regular parishioners may need to move from “their” seats; if someone unintentionally sits too close in front or behind you, quietly move to a socially distant position (thankfully, we have room to spare in our church). In the hall, follow the guidelines posted on each table. Unnecessary movements should be avoided, especially in the church.

The ability to come together to worship as brothers and sisters in Christ provides us with an opportunity to share our faith, love and hope at a very difficult time; let’s make every effort to make it possible to continue doing so.
