

***VENERABLE JOHN,  
DISCIPLE OF VEN. GREGORY  
OF DECAPOLIS***

Saint John was born at the end of the eighth century. At a young age he became a disciple of Saint Gregory of Decapolis and accepted monastic tonsure from him at a monastery in Thessalonica. Under the guidance of this experienced teacher, Saint John attained great spiritual perfection.

When the emperor Leo the Armenian (813-820) renewed persecution against Orthodox Christians because they venerated the holy icons, Saint Gregory of Decapolis and Saint Joseph the Hymnographer and his disciple Saint John went from Thessalonica to Constantinople to raise opposition to the Iconoclast heresy.

In spite of persecution, Saints Gregory and John fearlessly defended Orthodoxy for several years and preached the veneration of icons. After many hardships, Saint Gregory died (around 820), and soon after, his faithful disciple John also departed to the Lord. Saint Joseph the Hymnographer transferred the relics of Saints Gregory and John and placed them in the church of Saint Nicholas the Wonderworker.

### NEW MARTYR ST. ELIZABETH'S PRAYER

The New Martyr St. Elizabeth is one of the more beloved and honored of 20<sup>th</sup> century Orthodox saints. Her life is extraordinary, a combination with elements of a love story, drama, political factions, evangelical devotion, inspired Christian charity and, finally, martyrdom. She is truly a saint for our time because she exemplifies that one can be a faithful and pious Orthodox Christian and also a person with modern sensibilities. Information about her is easy to find on the internet. There is a book biography of her, available in our parish library and for purchase in the La Coupole store.

She created a prayer by combining three separate Biblical passages that had special meaning for her. It may not appear to be anything exceptional, but looking at how each of the passages reveals distinct spiritual qualities, we see that here is a prayerful meditation that can strengthen our faith during times of doubts and weakness.

Those who wait for the Lord,  
shall renew their strength,  
they shall mount up with wings like eagles,  
they shall run and not be weary,  
they shall walk and not faint. (*Isaiah 40:31*)  
Lord, I believe, help my unbelief. (*Mark 9:24*)  
Let us not love in word or speech,  
but in deed and in truth. (*I John 3:18*)

The first part of the prayer is about faith, not as “blind faith,” but as *trust*. It comes from the 40<sup>th</sup> Chapter in the Book of Isaiah, where the Prophet addresses the people during a time of great crisis with words of comfort. Here the word “wait” does not mean “waiting for something,” but rather *standing firm*, that is, *trusting* God. Isaiah motivates the people by assuring them that if they *stand firm* in the Lord, God will lift them “like eagles,” and they will not “be weary” nor “faint.”

The quote from St. Mark’s Gospel, “Lord, I believe, help my unbelief,” appears to be about “unbelief” or doubt. This passage acknowledges that even with our doubts Jesus is sympathetic about us. There is certainly a comforting truth there. However, if we recall the context of what was taking place in St. Mark’s Gospel, Jesus was speaking about faith *in Him*, that is, *in* Jesus Christ. That is the faith by which “all things are possible.” Jesus Christ makes it possible for us to accept, overcome, endure and survive “all things.”

Finally, the passage from the First Epistle of St. John is about faith in God *as love*. Love and faith are connected because, as we read in St. John’s First Epistle, “God is love.” For Christians, to believe in God is to believe in love! God’s love is the basis of creation and salvation, and all of Jesus Christ’s life and teachings can be summarized by one word: love. “To love God and each other” is the guiding principle of Christian faith, activity, ethics, prayer and spirituality. If we need some confirmation about how God’s love becomes actualized in real life, we have the outstanding example of St. Elizabeth’s life and martyrdom.
